



Kainan 1890 – 125 Years Memory Turkey's and Japan's Friendship

The JCCC is proud to cooperate with the Japan Foundation, the Japanese Consulate, and the Turkish Consulate General in Toronto to present Mitsutoshi Tanaka's spectacular Japanese-Turkish co-production.

KAINAN 1890 was nominated for Japanese Academy Awards in 9 categories including Best Film, Best Director and Best Male and Female Performances and was a big hit at the 2016 TJFF.

The Art

The terms ukiyo-e and "Japanese woodblock prints" surely call to mind masterpieces of centuries past, such as Utamaro's bijin, Hokusai's Great Wave, and Hiroshige's Stations of the Tokaido. But another golden age of woodblock printing emerged in Japan in the early 20th century – the shin hanga (or "new prints") movement. The style is characterized by perspective and lighting that are more naturalistic than in earlier Japanese prints. Shin hanga often depicts temples, shrines and gardens but also extends to the natural world and portraiture.



Woodblock prints are the collaborative product of an artist, a carver, a printer,

and a publisher. Once carved, a wooden block may live on to produce future editions of a design. The seals and stamps of the artisans and the materials employed are used to ascertain the date of actual printing.

The Collection

Era's shin hanga collection began with the 1933 Kawase Hasui work, Kiyomizu Temple. In this scene we can see Hasui himself, who was later named a Living National Treasure, standing on the temple's famous balcony on a starry night, looking out over Kyoto. Over my long career as a technical translator of Japanese, the collection grew to include other giants of 20th century Japanese prints, such as Hiroshi Yoshida, Ohara Koson, Tsuchiya Koitsu, Ito Shinsui, and Takahashi Shotei.

The latter part of the century brought sosaku hanga ("creative prints"), which embraced the abstract and was led by artists such as Kiyoshi Saito and Shinoda Toko.

The lure of Japanese hanga also inspired westerners like Paul Jacoulet, Elizabeth Keith, and Clifton Karhu to study under Japanese masters and bring their own experience to the art form.

The Web Gallery

Era has served art lovers and collectors worldwide since 2010. The web shop is operated here in Toronto and is hosted at Trocadero.com in the United States along with many fine antique stores.

Shujon Mazumder, JCCC Judoka and Jita Kyoei

One of the key foundations of Judo, is the principle of jita kyoei, commonly translated at "mutual welfare and benefit". Kano Shihan, the founder of the Kodokan Judo Institute wrote: "As long as we coexist, each member of society and the groups



organised within must function in harmony and cooperation with the others. Nothing is more important than living prosperously together. If everyone acts with the spirit of mutual cooperation, each person's work benefits not only himself, but also others, and attaining this together will bring mutual happiness."

Long time JCCC member, Shujon Mazumder has been around the dojo for many years - he started as a beginner at Wynford, has been a volunteer counsellor at Kamp Kodomo, and was the first JCCC member to win a national judo championship. Over the years he was won numerous competitions, including winning a bronze medal representing Canada at the 2009 Pan-American championships. In 2011, as a university student Shujon was named one of the CIS Top Eight Academic All-Canadians. True to the Judo spirit of jita kyoei, Shujon's dedication, volunteerism and accomplishments have been recognized with the Nisei Veterans' Award and a Shinki-Kai Scholarship. In 2015, Shujon took a 2-year job teaching at the Canadian International School in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam where he taught International Baccalaureate students and acted as their advisor for completing their Research Foundation course. While there, he continued to practice judo - training and teaching children when asked - and he competed in the 2015 Viet Nam International Judo Championships, winning the silver medal.

Now 33 years old, Shujon currently holds the rank of yondan (4th degree black belt). Having rehabilitated from numerous injuries and multiple knee surgeries, he still competes selectively. Shujon had pretty much perfect results during the 2017-18 tournament season: Four tournaments, four first place finishes, with no points scored against. Shujon won gold medals at the 2017 Ontario Open Championships in November, at the Peel Judo Championships in April, and at the 2018 Canadian Open Championships in Calgary in May – his eighth national championship overall and fifth senior national title!

That's only 3 results, but this July, Shujon added an international tournament win - and more. Shujon returned to Vietnam for vacation, and took along an extra suitcase full of medical supplies to donate to people in need through the humanitarian organization "Not Just Tourists", a volunteer organization founded with the purpose of getting supplies to those who can't afford them.

Then to cap off both his tournament season and his vacation, he travelled from Vietnam to the Philippines to compete in the Hajime Judo Tournament in Quezon City, where again, at the end of competition Shujon stood at the top of the podium.

own family history that can be shared for generations. Bring your children and/or grandchildren to open their eyes to our Japanese Canadian history through the photographs yellowed, creased, and sometimes a bit torn, but still able to convey a story.

Stories of times before WWII when we were young people enjoying friendships and activities that brought us together. A time when our Issei parents were building their lives of prosperity and a belief and hope that their children would become successful Canadian citizens, merging the traditions they brought with them from Japan and those that were the new traditions being encountered in Canada. A time when there was



a normalcy in living our daily lives.

Then the unthinkable happened and our world was turned upside down. Family and friends were faced with separation some to internment camps, sugar beet farms, independent communities, prisoner of war camps, or even going back to Japan, a place some of the children had never even visited. Forced to move to interior British Columbia or further eastward, families made the best that they could of their situation. Issei parents' desire to maintain

some semblance of normalcy for their children resulted in internment camps often being the start of life long friendships and the strengthening of community.

This sense of community lay dormant following the end of the war as Japanese Canadians moved eastward or some, back to Japan. But as Issei found new homes and work and Nisei married and began to have their own families a need for and sense of community began to emerge. Those who became fast friends in internment camps were happy to find that many of their families were settling in the same areas. It also helped that several of the churches initially provided and encouraged Japanese Canadians to use their facilities for sports and dances, which helped to rekindle their spirit of community.

And the community began to prosper even through the racism and prejudices still surrounding them. Other communities, especially the Jewish community provided great support offering them jobs and places to live. And that was all that was needed for them to rebuild and prosper once again.

Landscapes of Injustice Lecture and Research Presentation

Landscapes of Injustice is a seven-year research project based at the University of Victoria with an office in the Centre for Asia-Pacific Initiatives. The project is funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada and 15 partner institutions which include, among others, the Nikkei National Museum, Royal BC



Museum, Canadian Immigration Museum Pier 21, Vancouver Japanese Language School & Japanese Hall, Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre, four other academic institutions and the National Association of Japanese Canadians.

It is a unique partnership project, bringing together academics and community organizations to research the different aspects of the dispossession and forced sale of property owned by Japanese Canadians during the 1940s. The project has just passed the midway point and is beginning to transition from the Research phase to the Knowledge Mobilization phase.

Project Manager, Michael Abe will be on hand to give an overview of the project, outlining the research that has been undertaken and informing the audience of the plans to disseminate the results of the primary research to the Nikkei community and general public. This will also include a demonstration of how the community can use the information to research their own history.

After a short refreshment break, Michael will be joined by Ilana Ross, an elementary school teacher in Toronto who has been testing our pilot lesson module in her Grade 5 class. She will share firsthand her experience with this interactive classroom activity and talk about some of the extraordinary results.

We will also give an update on the progress of the travelling museum exhibit that is currently being created from the Landscapes research by curators at the Royal BC Museum and the Nikkei National Museum. This museum exhibit will have a stop at the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre, one of the founding partners of the Landscapes project.

Heritage Archives Pays Tribute to Nana Nishimura

On Sunday July 29, 2018 a memorial service for Nana Nishimura was arranged by her long-time friends Keiko and Jim Alsop. Nana was an active volunteer of Heritage's Archive Team almost since its beginning, coming each week to help catalogue and identify people in the photos and sharing her stories about living in Grand Forks during the war and the volunteer work both



she and her mother, Tomiko Nishimura, did at the JCCC. In fact, her volunteer work was recently acknowledged by her being selected as one of this year's Ontario Volunteer Service Award winners from the JCCC.

Nana never married and lived alone, but her life, although in many ways very private, appeared to be far from lonely. From the stories shared at her memorial celebration, her life was filled with the love of friends. They became her family, her traveling companions as she trotted the globe, her theatre buddies, her teaching friends, and her hiking university group. She was well remembered and loved, as attested to by the many friends who attended her service and shared stories about Nana.

Nana and her mother were long time volunteers at the JCCC and although quiet in nature, Nana made a most positive impact. She will be remembered for sharing her knowledge, telling her stories, her great appetite for food, and for joining in on many of our events at the Centre.

Nana was important to so many, thus her friends at the JCCC and in Heritage Archives would like to make a request for donations in memory of Nana. We realize this may be a bit unusual, but our hope is to have Nana and her mother Tomi's names inscribed on the Friends of the Moriyama Nikkei Heritage Centre wall or even on the Fred Sasaki Wall of Honour, as a fitting tribute and remembrance of Nana.

The JCCC Rooftop is Now Home to Honeybees

This Spring, Mariko Kawano opened an apiary on the rooftop of the JCCC. Mariko is a third generation Japanese Canadian beekeeper. Her grandfather, Kaichi Kawano taught himself beekeeping and took it up as a hobby when he was a young man, living on his family strawberry farm in the 1930's in Abbotsford, British Columbia. Working with nature and having a deep respect for living things is in Mariko's roots.

The name of Mariko's apiary is Heiwa Honey. Heiwa means peace and harmony in Japanese. She chose this name because it combines her Japanese heritage and her beekeeping philosophy, to raise bees ethically and organically, in peace and harmony with nature. Mariko became a beekeeper to support bees, who continue to face hardships due to climate change, loss of habitat, poor beekeeping practices and most notably pesticide use. Since Toronto has banned pesticides, Mariko believes that urban apiaries at locations like the JCCC may be the future for bees and other pollinators. With all of the parks, green corridors and forage surrounding the JCCC, such as the Don Mills Trail, Serena Gundy Park, E.T. Seton Park, Edwards Gardens, the Toronto Botanical Gardens and Wilket Creek Park, Mariko believes that the new bees living on the rooftop of the JCCC will not only be healthier than those living in rural areas, she believes they will thrive.



健やかな老後をめざして その17

腰痛の原因と対策



多くの人が経験するのが腰痛。一般的に「原因を特定できない腰痛(85%程度)よりも原因が明らかな腰痛(15%程度) が要注意」と言われます。原因が明らかなものとは骨折、脊椎炎、神経の圧迫(椎間板ヘルニア、脊柱管狭窄症)、がんの転 移、内臓に由来する腰痛など。腰痛を引き起こす内臓の病気とは胃潰瘍、胆石、膵炎、腎盂炎、尿路結石、子宮内膜症、子宮 筋腫や腹部大動脈瘤など。腰痛が長く続く場合はこれらとの関連にも注目してみましょう。

腰痛を長期に放っておくと、歩行障害などが進行して日常生活が困難となり、生活の質が低下してしまうことも…。受診してその原因を見極め、適切な治療を受けることが大切です。原因を特定できない場合は薬や装具、理学療法などの保存的治療を受けながら、経過を観察することになるでしょう。特に、腰痛の改善や再発防止のためには「姿勢と運動」が大事です。

10年前に腰、股関節と膝に痛みを経験しました。整形外科医orthopedic specialistと整体術師chiropractorによる診断 を受けたところ、もっとも多い原因とされる筋肉系の衰え(老化)に疲労が重なったことでした。人生初の大舞台に向けて 日本舞踊の集中稽古に励んでいたので、身体も精神も疲れ果てていたのでしょう。

その際、まず指導されたのが正しい姿勢と歩き方!普段から意識的に「顎を少し引き、胸を張って背筋を伸ばし、お臍の下をぐっと引締め、膝 を伸ばす姿勢」を心がけ、足の指10本をしっかり使うように靴下や靴の選び方に注意を払うようになりました。半年ごとに検査も継続していま す。それらが良い姿勢を維持できている理由と言えるでしょう。

運動は脳の循環をよくし、痛みを抑制する働きに関わるドパミン(神経伝達物質)の放出を促します。心が軽やかになると(楽しい、嬉しいなど)ドパミン放出が促進されるので、好きな運動を楽しみながら行うのがいいですね!

私は大好きな曲のリズムに合わせて、ラジオ体操、フラダンス、洋舞、民族舞踊、盆踊りなどを組み合わせ(めちゃくちゃ踊りと名付けて)30 ~40分ほど楽しく踊っています。ただし「今、身体のどの部位に焦点を当てているのか(首、肩、腰、股関節、下肢筋肉あるいは深部筋肉なのか)」 を意識しています。身体効果だけではなく、心もとても解放されます。自宅でやれるのが長続きの秘訣。あれから10歳も年を重ね60代後半に突 入しましたが、どの部位にも痛みは再発していません。

また、慢性腰痛はストレス、うつ、不安の影響も大きいことが明らかになっています。それらが長期間続くと脳の痛みを伝える機能が低下し、 わずかな腰痛でも強く感じたり、長引くようになります。痛みに対する脳の仕組みは、腰痛に限らず様々な痛みにも言えることです。「痛みに対 する治療をきちんと受けると同時に前向きな考えと行動を心がけることが、痛みから解放されるポイント」ではないでしょうか。

これまで種々の状況(手術など)を経験したのですが、好奇心が勝って痛みはどこへ?! 医療者にあきれられたことも度々(笑)。私が痛みに強いのは、何事にも好奇心旺盛で前向きにとらえる性格のせいかも…たった今、気づきました!


