The JCCC is committed to the safety and the well-being of our staff, volunteers, members, visitors and community. We continue to take all reasonable steps to ensure risks to health and safety are identified, assessed and managed appropriately. In accordance with the Province of Ontario's reopening plan, as of March 1, 2022, proof of vaccination will no longer be required to enter the JCCC. However, for the foreseeable future the JCCC will require participants in registered programs including martial arts, cultural classes and clubs to be fully vaccinated. Full vaccination is also required for staff, instructors and volunteers. Other protective measures, such as strongly recommending masks/ face coverings, social distancing, hand-washing and passive screening of patrons, will remain in place.

Through the next few Newsletters we will introduce the directors so that the members and community can become familiar and get to know the people that have been elected to represent and make decisions for the JCCC now and in to the future. There are varied backgrounds, skills, expertise in specific areas that all complement a hardworking and dedicated Board(s).

The JCCC Foundation Board oversees the investment of donations raised by the JCCC and are stewarding the capital so that operating funds are available to the JCCC. Also, the Board administers the Japan Earthquake Relief Fund. Chris Hope

Chris Hope's earliest memories of the JCCC consist of watching his grandmother, Nancy Okura, rehearsing performances with the Hifumi Steppers in preparation for Caravan, multiple events involving soba, and cheering his uncle Tom Okura to international tournament victory as he sparred as a member of the Centre's Shito Ryu Itosukai Karate Club - all seemingly enjoyed from the same vantage point in the bustling main auditorium in the mid-1980's, possibly all on the same day.

An entertainment lawyer by trade, Chris is an MBA and a Chartered Corporate Director with a specialty in not-for-profit administration and governance.

For more than ten years, Chris has served with the JCCC Board of Directors in multiple capacities and prior to that as a member of the JCCC's heritage committee. He is currently the JCCC Capital Campaign Chair, and a member of the JCCC Foundation Board. In 2011, Chris had the honour of co-founding the Toronto Japanese Film Festival at the JCCC with JCCC Executive Director and serious Japanese cinemaphile, James Heron.

In 2012, Chris's documentary about his grandmother's experiences during the Japanese Canadian internment entitled Hatsumi was widely released in Canada, leading to many opportunities to speak to audiences in Canada, the U.S. and Japan about the Japanese Canadian internment. He produced the multiple award-winning music documentary The Wrecking Crew and continues to produce content as a volunteer for the JCCC, from Sakura Gala biographic videos to, most recently, the Keep the Lantern Lit fundraiser video updates.

Since 2013 Chris has also served as a member of the Board of Governors of the Japanese American National Museum (JANM) in Los Angeles, as the first and only non-American member of the JANM board to date.



Gary Kawaguchi

Gary has been a director on the board of the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre (JCCC) since 1993 and currently serves as President (since 2009). He has also been on the board of the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre Foundation since inception in 2001.

For over 25 years, Gary was an officer with Pepsi-Cola Canada, Canadian Tire, Canada Trust, Dundee Bancorp and Look Communications. From 2005 he built an insurance advisory and brokerage company specializing in employee group benefits, pension and Workers Compensation before selling his business in 2020 to Purves Redmond Limited one of Canada's largest independent insurance brokerage companies.

In 2014 Gary was also the President of the Summit Golf and Country Club and prior to that was on the board of the Canadian Cancer Society (Toronto).

He is proud to have supported the wonderful staff and volunteers of the JCCC for many years.

Marty Kobayashi

Marty, a sansei (third generation Japanese Canadian), was born and raised in Toronto. He is the middle child of three children of the late 'Coby' Yutaka and Yone Kobayashi, Founding Members and avid supporters of the JCCC.

Marty Kobayashi is a Past President of the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre. He served as President for 12 terms, his tenure spanning 25+ years from 1983 to 2009. He chaired or co-chaired the long-running JC Community Picnic from 1978 until the final picnic in 2018. In 2013 he was awarded an Ontario Volunteer Service Award for 50 years of service.

He was also awarded the Order of the Rising Sun in 2017, Japan's equivalent of the Order of Canada, for devoting 5 decades to help promote heritage, culture and understanding between Canada and Japan.

For the past 30+ years, Marty has been an Investment Advisor, currently with iA Private Wealth. As an example of his commitment and support to the JC community, he was the first "corporate tenant" when he relocated his professional offices to the second floor of the JCCC in 2009.

Marty takes great pride in carrying on his family legacy of giving back. He is a role model to his two adult children, Kristin and Kevin, and is an outstanding example of a true volunteer. Marty has a reputation for being reliable, responsible, and most of all, humble.

His favourite vacation destination is Hawai'i where he's visited more times than he has fingers and toes.



Sharon Marubashi

Sharon has been involved with the JCCC for over 40 years now and has been a Director on the Board since 1995, the Foundation Board (since 2001) and also Chair of the Japanese and Japanese Canadian Network Organization (JCNO). Her roles have been Secretary on both Boards and also Chair or Co-Chair for many of the JCCC annual events and festivals. In 2011, Sharon was chosen to be part of the Japanese Canadian Leadership Delegation – a program of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Japan – to represent the JCCC and travelled to Japan which included meeting Princess Takamado in the itinerary.

Sharon attended University of Toronto and graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Psychology. She worked at CIBC and completed courses with the Institute of Canadian Bankers. She retired from CIBC in 2017, after 37 years, as a Financial Services Representative.



Sid Ikeda

Sid Ikeda's goal has always been to promote harmony and peace by working together. He has been involved with the JCCC since 1974 and served as President for nine terms. He has since taken on the role of Community Advisor to the Board and represents the JCCC at many functions. He was very active in the centennial celebration, a founding member of the JCCC Foundation, the Japanese and Japanese Canadian Network Organization, Momiji Health Care Society, and the Canadian Multicultural Council-Asians of Ontario. Sid has been on the advisory council to the Metropolitan Police Chief through the tenure of the last 4 chiefs. He has chaired and participated in countless fundraising events for charities.

In his career, Sid worked for Eaton's for 40 years and worked his way up to eventually become the National Environment and Energy Manager. He retired from Eaton's in 1996 and started the Ikeda Consulting Company to carry on in the field of Environment Energy and Public Relations.

Sid has received countless awards and recognitions, including The Order of the Rising Sun, Gold and Silver Rays from the Emperor of Japan, Japanese Government Award, Governor General Caring Canadian Award, Ontario Volunteer Service Award as well as awards from Toronto City Council, Police Dept. and the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal.

JCCC Honour our Seniors Event and JCCC Seniors Outreach Program Update

Additionally, the JCCC Seniors Outreach Program focuses on JC Survivors who, due to health and mobility issues, are not always able to attend JCCC events at the centre.

The Honour our Seniors event is an exciting one-day event where invitees will have the opportunity to meet with friends and family, explore archival photos from that time period, meet with others who shared the same experience, enjoy entertainment, and of course food! Invitations to this event will be mailed to those for whom we have contact information.

The JCCC Seniors Outreach Program has had a very positive response and we are near to capacity. The deadline for registering is April 4th so if you are an interested candidate, sign up soon. Program details will be sent out to registered participants after registration closes.

Volunteers for the JCCC Seniors Outreach Program are needed.

Hanami Bento

Possible Bento Items

Vegetables

Japanese pickles nappa tsukemono beer zuke instant takuwan cold eggplant miso yaki cold spinach shira'ae carrot and daikon salad cucumbers or cherry tomatoes edamame brocoli radish

Starch

onigiri of any kind inarizushi store bought maki sushi white rice

No Cherry Blossom viewing party is complete without colorful hanami bentos. Specially prepared to enjoy during this important spring festival, these delightful bento boxes are brimming with the bounty of the season. They are meant to represent not only the cherry blossoms, but the arrival of Spring, so pink, red and orange hues predominate. The bento can contain anything that you would like to prepare or have on hand, but generally feature foods common to the spring.

Tips to keep in mind...

1. Make sure to choose items that will taste good cold. You will need to keep your bento chilled with an ice pack or in a cooler if you are going to be travelling for more than an hour to view cherry blossoms.

2. Keep preparation simple. Choose items that you can make from leftovers or that are simple to prepare the day before. On the morning of, you can add any items that need to be made fresh, like inarizushi or onigiri.

3. Consider store bought items. Although prepared bento are not as abundantly available in Toronto, you can supplement your bento with store bought salads, pickles, gyoza or meatballs in sauce. Fresh fruits and vegetables also make a great addition to your bento.

Interview with Kiyoshi on the next page

Nagata Shachu Japanese Taiko and Music Group and the JCCC proudly present "Kaze" featuring master bamboo flutist from Japan, Toki Tatara. Marking the first concert at Kobayashi Hall since the pandemic, Toronto's own Nagata Shachu will collaborate with Tatara in a performance that will seamlessly combine the worlds of shinobue (bamboo flute), taiko, and the three-stringed shamisen while exploring new possibilities for these traditional instruments.

Born in Kyoto, Tatara has spent her musical life in the research of bamboo flutes. She actively composes and performs many of her own works, having cultivated both Japanese traditional and Western classical techniques. In pursuit of the full potential of the shinobue which is somewhat nostalgic in the souls of the Japanese people, Tatara performs music that touches upon the hearts of this generation. Tatara has recorded several CDs and is the Director of the Japan Shinobue Association, professor at Okayama Niimi Public University, and shinobue music club instructor at the

Professor at Okayama Niimi Public University, and shinobue music club instructo Ueno Gakuen Music University.



An Interview with Kiyoshi of Nagata Shachu

Kiyoshi has discussed about his/group's history, dreams, etc. as well as concert's highlight of up-coming concert at the JCCC.



1. Brief profile of Kiyoshi and Nagata Shachu

I have been playing taiko for forty years now. I first began by taking taiko classes at the JCCC and one year later, joined Toronto Suwa Daiko in 1983. After nine years in the group (and eventually becoming the group's leader), I moved to Japan to become an apprentice with the renowned Kodo drummers on Sado Island. For a full year, I trained to become a professional taiko player and lived communally with other students who came from across Japan. Upon returning to Canada in 1994, I began freelancing as a taiko artist and teacher before starting my own group Nagata Shachu in 1998. Ever since, the group has been extremely active touring, performing and producing its own three concert season, often collaborating with national and international guest artists. We have recorded several CDs and DVDs and teach public classes out of our studio in Scarborough.

2. Please discuss the appealing features of Wadaiko and differences from other styles of drums.

Wadaiko is unique I believe, in that you must use your entire body when striking the taiko. It is a very visual art form that incorporates choreographed movements, team work, physical stamina as well as spirituality and grace. The taiko can also be much larger than any other kind of drum (up to 8 feet in diameter!) which gives it its thunderous quality, and the bachi (drumsticks) can be the size of a small log.

3. How did you become involved in Taiko? Did you have a special moment/incident where you wanted to become a pedriving force to continue to work as a professional musician?

professional Taiko drummer? What is the driving force to continue to work as a professional musician?

The first taiko performance I saw was at a multicultural festival called Caravan in 1981 where the JCCC invited a group from Japan called Osuwa Daiko led by Daihachi Oguchi, who is considered a taiko pioneer and grandmaster. I was mesmerized by the powerful sound of the taiko which I could feel with my entire body. It was also so beautiful to watch. A couple years later, I saw Kodo perform in Toronto. Their performance was extremely physical yet very expressive, flawless and artistic. It was at that point, I decided to pursue a career as a professional musician and I have never looked back. Despite the many hardships a musician can encounter, I am driven by my pursuit to grow and develop as an artist and to find new ways to use taiko as an instrument to express my creativity.

4. What is your dream? ---future plans for your/Nagata Shachu activities.

My dream is to continue to spread the sound of taiko to communities across Canada and around the world through both our live performances and videos. I truly believe that taiko has the ability to bring people together as its primal sound is a universal one which anyone can relate to. I hope Nagata Shachu will continue to grow both artistically and as an organization. Through our workshops and educational programs, we hope to inspire a new generation of younger taiko players who can continue to grow and expand this art form.

5. Can you tell us about the concert "Kaze"? What is a new aspect/difference of the collaboration concert? Which part of the show are you hoping the audience will notice?

Although Nagata Shachu regularly collaborates with artists from Japan and from a variety of genres, the collaboration with renowned shinobue (bamboo player) Toki Tatara is a very special one for us. As a female shinobue player, Tatara brings a uniquely feminine perspective to an instrument that has traditionally been dominated by men. Nagata Shachu is looking forward to creating new music and collaborating with an artist of such a high calibre, and we are excited to share the results of our efforts to those who will come to our concert at the JCCC!

5月1日にJCCCで公演を行う永田社中のリーダー、永田清さんにお話を伺いました。

1. 永田清さんと永田社中についてお話しください。

太鼓演奏を始めて40年になります。JCCCで太鼓クラスを取ったのが初めで、その一年後、1983年にトロント諏訪太鼓に入り、9年間諏訪太鼓で活動を続けました(グループリーダーも務めました)。その後、佐渡の鼓童のもとで修行するために日本へ渡り、丸一年間、日本各地から集まった訓練生と 生活し、プロの太鼓奏者となるための特訓に励みました。1994年カナダに帰国し、1998年に永田社中を結成するまでの間、個人演奏や教授活動を 行いました。グループ結成後はツアー、公演と精力的に活動、国内外の音楽家や舞踏家とのコラボコンサートも開催しています。永田社中はCD、DVDの レコーディング、スカーボロのスタジオでの和太鼓クラスも行っています。

2. 和太鼓/三味線/和楽器の魅力と、他国のドラムとの違いは何ですか?

和太鼓は体全体を使って演奏するという点から、とてもユニークであると思っています。又、振り付け、チームワーク、体力が必要とされる和太鼓は、精神 性とその優美を併せ持ったビジュアルアートの最たるものです。他のドラムと比べて和太鼓はそのサイズでも特別で、大きいものでは直径8フィート、バ チは小さい丸太ほどの大きさもあり、それが雷のような音を奏でます。

3. 和太鼓にはまり、プロとして活動しようと志したきっかけと、和楽器奏者として今まで続けてこられた原動力はなんですか?

初めて太鼓演奏を見たのは、JCCCで行われた1981年キャラバン(マルチカルチャーフェスティバル)で、太鼓のパイオニアとして名高い小口大八率 いる諏訪太鼓の演奏でした。その時、体全体に響き渡る力強い音に驚かされました。それにビジュアル的に美しかったのです。その二年後に鼓童のトロ ント公演を見ました。鼓童のパフォーマンスは非常に肉体的であり、且つ表現力が豊かで、完璧な芸術でした。私がプロのミュージシャンを目指すこと を決意したのはこの時で、以後この決断を後悔したことはありません。ミュージシャンがぶつかる数々の困難にもかかわらず、アーティストとして輝き、 成長を目指し、和太鼓で創作表現をする新しい道を探求していくという気持ちが自分自身を動かし続けています。



4. 今後の夢は?

私の夢は自分たちのライブ公演と映像でカナダ全土はもとより世界中に和太 鼓の音を広げ続けることです。太鼓の原始的な音はなじみやすく普遍的で、人 々を一つにする力を持っていると私は確信しています。永田社中が芸術的にも グループとしても成長し続けることを願っています。又、ワークショップや教育 プログラムを通して若い世代が触発され、この和太鼓という芸術を成長させ 広げていってくれることも希望しています。

5. 今回のコラボ企画はこれまでのコンサートとどのように違う か、見どころを教えてください。

永田社中はジャンルの違う日本のアーティストと定期的にコラボを行っていま すが、著名な篠笛奏者の朱鷺たたらさんとの今回のコラボは一段と特別なもの です。たたらさんの演奏には男性主流の篠笛に女性ならではの表現が加わりま す。永田社中は、たたらさんのような力量あるアーティストとの共演で新しい音 楽を作り上げていくことを楽しみにしています。そしてその努力の結晶をJCCC 公演にいらっしゃる観客の方々と共感したいと思っています。

健やかな老後をめざして その50

シニアと新型コロナウイルスとの共生...

新型コロナウイルス感染症(COVID-19)と向き合いながら暮らす日々は 既に2年以上となりました。次々と変異株が出現し、未だオミクロン株との闘 いが続いています。2~3月に、オンタリオ州は感染者数、入院数や重症者数 が減少していることにより行動制限を緩和しました。しかし、実際に感染して も自己管理であり、報告しない人々は統計に含まれていません。ともかく、 オンタリオ州政府は諸々の状況を鑑みて「事態は収束に向かっている」と判 断しましたが、行動緩和そのものは基礎疾患(持病)を持つ人やシニアにとっ て安全で安心な生活が保障されたことを意味するものではありません。オン タリオ州および日本は「死亡者の約90%はシニアである」と報告しています。

オミクロン株は、同じコロナウイルスの仲間であるSARS(重症急性呼吸 器症候群)やMERS(中東呼吸器症候群)に比べると、病気を引き起こす能 力は強くないですが、感染力がとても強いのでワクチン接種していたとして も安心はできません。「3回目接種後2~3ヶ月で中和抗体の値は減少して いくものの、入院や重症化率は抑えられている」との報告もありますが、有 効性に関する検証がさらに必要です。

まずは持病の管理をしっかり行いましょう。特に、呼吸器系の病気のある 人は、普段と比べて咳・だるさ・呼吸困難などの症状が強くなっていないかに 注意しましょう。心血管系の病気があると重症化リスクは高まります。心臓と 肺とは密接に関わっています。肺から新鮮な血液が心臓に送られ、心臓のポ ンプ機能によって全身を巡り、やがて心臓、そして肺へともどってくるのです。 もし感染をきっかけに心臓の機能低下が進むと、容易に肺炎が悪化し、重症 化しやすくなります。また「ウイルスが心臓の筋肉に感染して急性心筋炎を起 こす」との報告もあります。 さて、人々の意識に欠けがちなのが慢性腎臓病です!加齢に伴い、腎機能は確実に低下していきます。あなたの機能レベル(糸球体ろ過値e-GFR、-Creatinine値)を知っていますか?検査したら、その数値にビックリするかも…それほど静かに深く落ちていくのです。初期段階では全く自覚症状はなく、だるさ、食欲不振、むくみ、血圧上昇、貧血や息切れ等の症状が現れた頃には既に進行しており、回復させるのは非常に難しいです。ですから、早期発見がとても大切です。新型コロナによって肺炎が起こると腎臓への血流が減り、急性腎障害が起こりやすく、腎機能低下のある人ではさらに悪化する恐れがあります。私は50代よりe-GFRとCreatinineのレベルを把握し、減塩や血圧管理などに心がけ、正常レベルを保っています。

また、糖尿病、高血圧、肥満などがあれば、やはり重症化リスクが気がか りですね。「糖尿病があると肺炎などのリスクは基本的に高くなる」「肥満が あるとサイトカインストーム(免疫システムの暴走)が起こりやすく、様々な 臓器に障害が起こって重症化する」と指摘されています。前述した種々な病 気を合併していれば、なおさら注意が必要です!

持病があるからと言って、特別な予防方法はありません。基本的な対策 (マスク、手洗い、密閉・密集・密接を避ける)を徹底し、治療をしっかり継 続しましょう。そして、心身の体調を整えるために食事、運動、休息と睡眠に 一層の関心と工夫を!

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
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
